A moon garden is a unique type of garden designed outdoor space specifically to be enjoyed during the evening and night time hours, under the soft light of the moon.

Unlike traditional gardens that dazzle during the day, moon gardens come to life after sunset, offering a serene, luminous and often fragrant environment ideal for quiet reflection, romantic evenings, or peaceful walks.

Concept and aesthetic

The central idea behind a moon garden is to use color, texture, scent and reflection to create a space that glows in the dark. This is achieved by incorporating:

- White and pale-colored flowers, which reflect moonlight and remain visible in low light.
- Silvery or variegated foliage, such as dusty miller or lamb's ear, which shimmer in the dark.
- Night-blooming and fragrant plants, like night-blooming jasmine and evening primrose which release their stronger scent after dusk.
- Reflective materials, such as white gravel paths, light stones or water features and

seating areas to bounce light around the space and enhances the nighttime experience.

Soft lighting, like solar lamps or lanterns, to gently illuminate the garden without overpowering the natural glow of the moon.

Historically, the concept dates back to gardens like the 16th-century Mehtab Bagh in India, designed to be appreciated under moonlight.

Designing Your Moon Garden

To create a captivating moon garden:

1. **Choose a suitable location:** Select an area that receives ample moonlight and is visible from your evening sitting spots.
2. **Use symmetry and circular layout:** which feel more harmonious and magical at night.
3. **Incorporate reflective elements:** Use white gravel, light-colored stones or water features such as a small pond or fountain, to reflect light and add soothing sound.
4. **Add gentle lighting:** Install solar-powered lights or lanterns to highlight pathways and focal points without overpowering natural light.

5. **Include seating areas:** Place benches, chairs or swings to encourage relaxation and enjoyment of the nocturnal ambiance.
6. **Incorporate natural materials:** Stone or wood, to maintain an earthy, calming atmosphere.
7. **Plan for sensory engagement:** Integrate fragrant plants and elements that produce soothing sounds, like rustling grasses or trickling



Silvery or Variegated Foliage

- Lamb's ear (*Stachys byzantina*)
- Dusty miller (*Jacobaea maritima*)
- Silver sage (*Salvia argentea*)

Fragrant Night-Bloomers

- Tuberose (*Agave amica*)
- Four o'clock flower (*Mirabilis jalapa*)
- Chocolate daisy (*Berlandiera lyrata*)

These plants not only enhance visual appeal but also engage the senses through scent and texture moon gardens are not just visually appealing, they can be deeply symbolic. In many cultures, the moon is associated with femininity, mystery, intuition and renewal. A moon garden can thus serve as a space for meditation, moon rituals or personal introspection.



Plants Ideal for a Moon Garden

White or Pale Flowers

- Moonflower (*Ipomoea alba*)
- Evening primrose (*Oenothera biennis*)
- Shasta daisy (*Leucanthemum x superbum*)
- Gardenia (*Gardenia jasminoides*)
- Night-blooming jasmine (*Cestrum nocturnum*)
- Hydrangea (*Hydrangea* spp.)
